12 MONTHS TO LIVE by James Patterson and Mike Lupica

Jane Smith, a tough-as-nails defence lawyer who's never lost a case, is diagnosed with terminal cancer just as she's preparing to represent Hamptons real estate mogul Rob Jacobson in a murder trial. He's been charged with slaughtering three members of a Suffolk County family, and Smith is far from convinced of his innocence, misgivings exacerbated when she learns midtrial that Jacobson has been lying to her about his relationship with the victims. Meanwhile, Smith agrees to help with an inquiry into a different triple homicide being funded by the victims' family, and embarks on a romance with a veterinarian. As the cases wear on, she begins receiving threatening notes that urge her to drop her defence of Jacobson—or die.



THE BONE TREE by Airana Ngarewa

The story of two brothers in the shadow of Taranki Maunga (mountain). Kauri and Blacks mother had been gone now for 6 months. 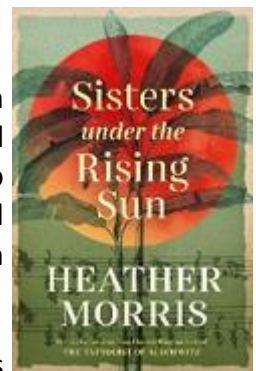


SISTERS UNDER THE RISING SUN by Heather Morris

This is a story of women in war. A group of Australian nurses and others, mainly British who fled Malaya to Singapore to escape the Japanese. As the Japanese Army moved into Singapore, they reluctantly fled again on the merchant ship Uynier Brooke. Two days into the voyage the ship was bombed and sunk. For those who survived and eventually made it to Mantok, there followed three and a half years of internment in Sumatra. Women and children were separated from the men.

Based on a true story, this novel follows Nesta and Margaret through their lives as prisoners under Japanese rule.



MEET YOU AT THE MAIN DIVIDE By Justine Ross with Geoff Ross

This book is written in the first person and has colourful language at times. It has its moments, some of the accounts are quite blunt. 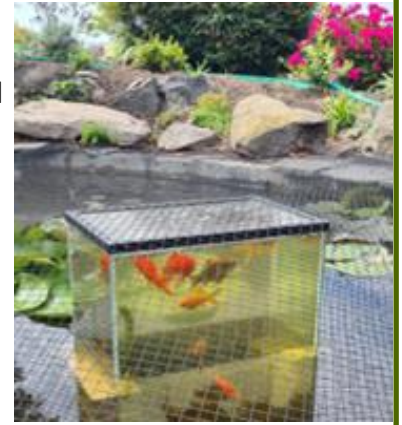
FISHPOND NEWS: We have been very lucky to get some "rescue fish" thanks to Angela hearing about some being given away. That brings our total to around 35 give or take.

Courgette and Bacon Bake. Serves 4.

1 Tab oil	1 onion finely diced	2 rashers bacon, finely chopped
5 cups grated courgette (abt 4 medium courgettes)		½ cup grated tasty cheese
¾ cup self raising flour	4 eggs	½ cup plain oil S&P

Preheat oven to 175 °C and line a 26cm x 17 cm baking dish. In a small frying pan heat the 1 Tab olive oil and brown the onion and crisp the bacon.

Squeeze any excess moisture from the courgettes. In a large bowl, combine the courgettes, cheese, and flour. *Optional, add finely chopped mint.*

In a separate bowl whisk the eggs, oil and seasoning. Add the bacon and onion, add to the large bowl and mix well. Spoon into baking dish and bake 20-25 minutes. Set aside before cutting.

Can use gluten free flour, add 1tsp Baking Powder and cook about 40 minutes.

Courgette Pasta Otago Farmers' Market Recipe.

Heat a little olive oil and add a smashed garlic clove, quickly add ribbons made from 6 courgettes.

Once courgettes are glossy and softened, build sauce in same pan with - ½ pre-served lemon, 1 tsp mustard, juice of 1 lemon or a dash of white wine. Reduce sauce down until silky. Season with a scattering of parsley, and sharp cheese.

Village Church Service—February 2024

The Rev Alan Cummins, the South Canterbury Hospital Board Chaplain, took the Village church service in February. Elaine Caird, kindly came again to be our pianist. Hymns sung were Count Your Blessings, Servant Song and Blessed Assurance. The Gospel of Luke 2: 21-40 was the reading from which Allan gave his message. The following are his notes-

Candlemas – 2 February. We light all the candles!!

- We remember Jesus being presented in the Temple for: (1) Naming – the name given by the angel (2) Circumcision – on the 8th day after his birth and (3) Mary's purification after childbirth.
- Mary was only allowed in The Courts of the Women – the Outer Courts of the Temple as she was ritually unclean for 40 days after the birth of a boy; for a girl it was 80 days!
- Offerings were made to the priests for the gift of a child. A lamb was ideal, but they were costly to buy. Mary and Joseph were poor, so they gave either two pigeons or two doves, known as the Offering of the Poor.
- These ancient requirements were all laid out in the Law of Moses from the books of Exodus and Leviticus.
- As part of God's plan Jesus was presented to Simeon, hence the 'Nunc Dimittis' or 'Song of Simeon' – known to many, and the prophetess Anna.
