## NOTES FROM TRUSTEES

The Trustees were delighted to see such a good attendance from you at the Residents' Half-Yearly meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> March. Resident's Rep, David Darling welcomed the Covenant Trustee Supervisor, Raylene McMeekan to the meeting. The Trustees along with Raylene were pleased to hear the overview of all the activities that you, the Mountain View Village Residents, have been able to be involved in during the last year. The Trustees appreciate knowing that all the committees are running well for the benefit of all residents.

It is 10 years since former MVV Trustee and Chairman, Paul Dewsbury, resigned after serving many years of service to the Trust. At that time, it was noted that it had taken from the beginning of the MVV Village in 1987 to have \$1,000,000 in the bank.

Budgeting for future infrastructure upgrades and the ongoing exterior maintenance takes good financial management and oversight which has been at the front and back of all decisions made at the monthly Trustee meetings from the very beginning. With 95 buildings plus a community centre, roading and water works to be looked after, you can see the importance of good budgeting.

### Maintenance:

Please be patient when waiting for planned maintenance work on your property to be undertaken. Our preferred tradespeople will attend to the work as soon as is practicable.

We have been made aware that the automatic doors at the main entrance were opening and closing at random recently. The doors had recently been serviced so we are not sure what the problem could have been. Therefore, **if anyone observes** this in the future, please take a video (remembering to stand back from the doors) and record the day, date and time and advise the admin staff.

This also applies to gardening work you ask Matt to do in your gardens. Matt is under contract to MVV Trust to look after the huge amount of landscaping for the MVV Trust. 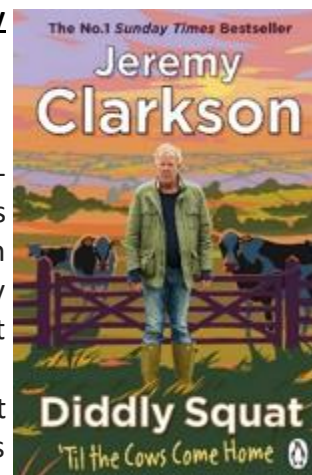

## DIDDLY SQUAT 'TILL THE COWS COME HOME by Jeremy Clarkson

Not a car in sight, this is copies of Jeremy's Sunday Times Columns and his effort to learn about hands on farming on his farm. Jeremy calls himself a trainee farmer and has written this in a humorous way covering the four seasons. Jeremy always has a plan some are cunning most don't turn out the way he intended.

## UNTOUCHABLE GIRLS by Jools and Lynda Topp.

This autobiographical story is told by both twins. Jools writes in black text and Lynda uses grey text to keep the reader reading without having to refer back to who is talking.

It starts in their childhood, which seems to have been idyllic with a built in playmate and a big brother. The only thing that marked them out as different was their preference for wearing their brother's clothes rather than the pretty dresses their mother made them.

Brother Stephen bought their first guitar with a book "How to play in a day", which is what Jools did, and they were off.

They moved to Auckland and then to Dunedin where they lived for a year and a half. It was there their act was born.

By this time they had "come out" as lesbians and also as political activists. They got very involved in protesting the Springboks tour of 1981 and staying on Bastion Point.

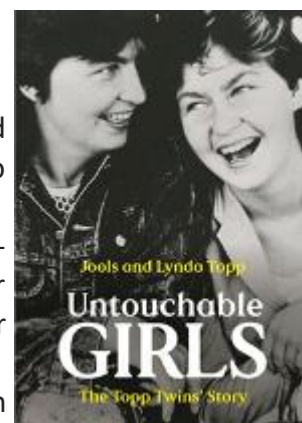
All the time earning their living entertaining, whether it was busking in the street or performing for Charles and Diana during a New Zealand tour.

Being members of the gay community was a very important part of their lives. In some parts of the book it seems that the word lesbian is on every page.

All the characters, Camp Mother, Camp Leader, the two Kens, etc are there. The story details overseas trips, famous people met, and the difficulties in having a career and a partner.

It is very much the pair of them telling you their story, and how you feel about them will colour your perception of it.

Sadly it closes with the fight they are both presently involved in. Against cancer. We can only wish them well.

### THE KEEPER OF HIDDEN BOOKS by Madeline Martin

Hitler invades Poland, Warsaw is being bombed and books are being removed and destroyed from Libraries as forbidden reading. A group of senior students have made it their goal to read as many forbidden books before they are removed. As life gets worse the libraries and books are the saviour for many and the race to save books is paramount and dangerous. Families are torn apart, lost or removed from their homes. A lot of the story is typical of wartime but the bravery of a few young girls to share the joy of books and save as much of Polish history at whatever cost makes for great reading.

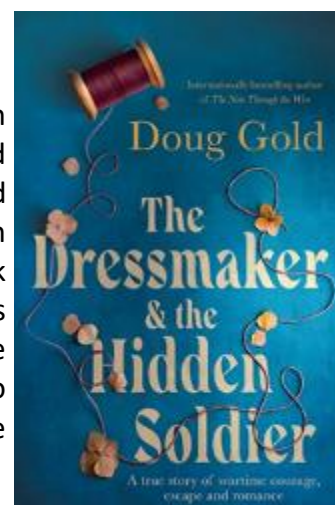
I thoroughly enjoyed this story and might have almost shared a tear at one part!



### THE DRESSMAKER & HIDDEN SOLDIER by Doug Gold

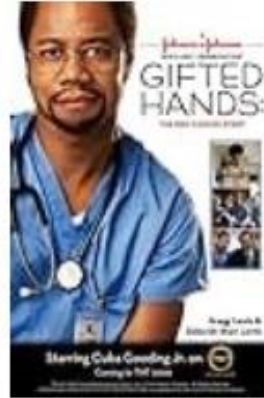
Mistrust is high in Nazi-occupied Greece in 1941. Information and betrayal can easily be purchased for as little as a loaf of bread and it takes sharp wit and instinct to exist under pressure. Tasoula Paschilidou and her eighteen-year-old son Thanasis run a professional dressmaking salon from her home in Thessaloniki – but this is a front for her expert leadership within the Greek national Liberation Front AKA The Resistance. From hiding allied force soldiers that have escaped from Nazi transit camps to aiding and abetting their escape routes, Tasoula is ever watchful, assessing the risks and doing all she can to lessen the deathly grip the Nazis have on her homeland. How long can she remain undetected?



Peter Blunden is a New Zealand soldier who dares to escape from the Prisoner-Of War transit camp by jumping from a moving train. He is fortunate to have the friendship of the more experienced, skilled escapee Patrick Minogue as they navigate their way through the German-soldier riddled villages. Patrick must return to 'Mrs Tasoulas' shelter to warn of betrayals. Can they enact a trustworthy plan to escape. Within the safe house that Tasoula provides Peter first casts his eyes on the beautiful young dressmaking apprentice, Thalia and their love sets its course. Based on a true-story, Thalia and Peter play a dangerous game under the dominance and oppression from German occupation within Thessaloniki in World War Two. Heartbeats are heightened as it becomes increasingly risky to stay within the safe house provided.

Wellington based Doug Gold is the author of the non-fiction World War Two story *The Note Through The Wire* and *The Dressmaker And The Hidden Soldier* is his first fictionalized account of a true love story. With his meticulous research of the Greek prisons and Austrian concentration camps during World War Two, he brings together the remarkable ability of the human spirit to overcome and survive in the face of devastating war time cruelties.

## Bloke's Morning Tea—March Report

David Darling introduced Speaker Ron Keen the Surveyor & Deputy Leader of a Scientific Survey of NZ's remote "Sub Antarctic Campbell Is, Auckland Is, Snares and Antipodes" to 26 Blokes who attended our March 'get together'.

The Survey Team, were based aboard the HMNZS Monowai that included a Helicopter for access to remote parts of the Islands. They hold "National Park" and "UNESCO World Heritage Park" status and have a history of shipwrecks, castaways and survival.

Ron's extremely informative talk about his involvement in the Expedition included outstanding screen shots of the wild pristine Seascapes, the abundant Birdlife of: Shag, Skua, Pipit, Red Crested Parakeet Giant Petrel Snipe and breeding colonies of Sea lions, Seal and Yellow Eyed Penguins. He advised us that the Island's have ten of the world's albatross species and six are endemic. An ongoing eradication programme of feral Pigs, Rats, Mice, Cats and Cattle (from Enderby Is) has seen significant recovery of the native flora & fauna including giant Mega Herbs.

Thanks to Marlene who sets up the Kitchen each month, Chairman David D, Jim K, Fraser, John K, and Kevin for their part.

# Village Church Service—March Report

David Duthie, the Timaru Community Chaplain and, Hospice Chaplain led a very reflective church service after sharing a little of his interesting life. *“Every day is different; everything I do is by invitation, a privilege.”* David also has a programme, parenting with Dads’.

The Bible reading was, Psalm: 33. Our thanks to Faith, from the Salvation Army who played the piano as we sang- Be Thou my Vision, Just a Closer Walk with Thee, and Here I am Lord. David’s Theme was, Father, Heart of God. He read the following story.



Many years ago there was a young man, named Sawat living in a little village in the north of Thailand, where he found life rather boring; he wanted to chase the bright lights of Bangkok. There he was lured by all sorts of temptations but later found himself alone, living in a little shack. He thought about his father, a simple Christian man, and his father’s parting words, “I am waiting for you.” He wondered if his father would still be waiting for him after all he had done to dishonour his family name. Would he be welcomed home? Word had travelled back to his home village about his life of crime. *Dear father, he wrote, I want to come home but I don’t know if you will receive me after all that I have done. I have sinned greatly father, please forgive me. On Saturday night I will be on the train, if you are still waiting will you tie a piece of cloth on the Poe tree in front of our house?* As the train neared his house, Sawat asked the fellow passenger in whom he had confided in, that he could not bear to look out the window at the tree; would the passenger please do so. Sitting with his head between his legs, too scared to look, Sawat was told to look out the window to see the Poe tree not covered with one piece of white cloth, but covered with many pieces. His father embraced him with tears of joy as he alighted the train saying. “I have been waiting for you.”

This is how Our Father, reacts towards every one of us, not just the first time we turn to him but each time we come in humble repentance. Unconditional love, forgiveness, encouragement, acceptance. Keep praying for your families, grandchildren, friends, neighbours and yourselves. God is always waiting.

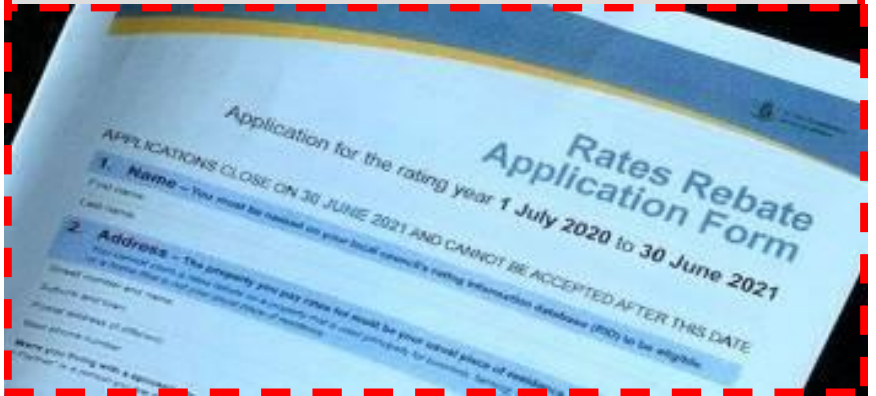
