Following my own experience with slipping on ice at the weekend, please make sure any wet patches on paths, steps and terraces have no ice on them.

2024-2025 Budget

The Trustees have discussed and agreed the proposed Budget for the coming financial year which will be circulated along to you in due course. If you would like to discuss the budget with the Trustees, please register your name at the office so that we can allow time prior to the 19th June meeting.

Gardens / Grounds

Matt has been doing a sterling job keeping the grounds tidy during the autumn with a heavy leaf fall followed by the pesky winds!!! Thank you to all the residents that are doing their bit with this leaf catching task too.

It has been a hugely frustrating time for Matt working to keep the grass in good condition for quite some months now. The lack of rain has had a huge bearing on this along with the fact we don't have an irrigation scheme in place. These schemes are hugely expensive to install and a reliable water supply required to operate efficiently. The Trustees appreciate everything that Matt does to keep the grass in as good condition as is possible.

Village Maintenance

The Maintenance team involving Graeme Thompson and Lester Frame, are doing an exterior check of the villas and units to confirm the plan and budget for work to be undertaken for the 2024-2025 year. Mr Thompson has reported that they are pleased with workmanship of the contractors involved with the concrete driveways that have been replaced and others who have undertaken the paint work and those remedial / maintenance jobs that have been achieved.

These will be discussed in more detail at the July Trust meeting when recommendations, proposed budgets and realistic timelines can be determined. 

THE WOMAN by Kirsten Hannah

'Women can be heroes, too'. When twenty-year-old nursing student, Frances "Frankie" McGrath, hears these unexpected words, it is a revelation. Raised on California's idyllic Coronado Island and

sheltered by her conservative parents, she has always prided herself on doing the right thing, being a good girl. But in 1965 the world is changing, and she suddenly imagines a different path for her life. When her brother ships out to serve in Vietnam, she impulsively joins the Army Nurses Corps and follows his path. As green and inexperienced as



the young men sent to Vietnam to fight, Frankie is overwhelmed by the chaos and destruction of war, as well as the unexpected trauma of coming home to a changed America. Frankie will also discover the true value of female friendship and the heartbreak that love can cause.

The Women is the story of one woman who goes to war, but it shines a light on the story of all women who put themselves in harm's way to help others. Women whose sacrifice and commitment to their country has been all too often forgotten. A novel of searing insight and lyrical beauty, The Women is a profoundly emotional, richly drawn story with a memorable heroine whose extraordinary idealism and courage under fire define an era.

THE SEVEN by Chris Hammer

Very easy reading – another great Australian novel to get engrossed in.





Bloke's Morning Tea—May Report

A record turnout of 30 Blokes enjoyed an interesting discussion by Tom Johnston the Timaru Port Tug Pilot Launch Master & Marine Supervisor, who shared may stories of his nautical experiences, including his role at the PrimePort.

Tom presented a Video of the last voyage of the fire-gutted Korean Trawler "Dong Won", that was towed from the Port and scuttled using explosives to its watery grave 25 nautical miles south-east of the Otago coast. The rusting hulk of the fishing vessel had been berthed at Prime Port for 3 years, after the fire gutted the ship during the unloading of its catch in 2018. 3 years of negotiations took place to ensure the Marine Environment is protected.

As photos of his experiences at Milford Sound couldn't be shown Tom answered a host of questions on his many duties at the Port.

The National Anthems of Australia and New Zealand were sung. Kay thought we were also to sing God Save The King, as there was no music, we sang without.


