### Maintenance

The Trustees have been made aware that a resident was not happy when an exterior maintenance matter, that had been recorded in the Maintenance Register, was investigated without being given notice when the contractor investigated the issue. **Please note:** maintenance contractors have day & time constraints to work within and often can be on site from 8.30am. When a contractor comes to look at one job our maintenance co-ordinator may ask the contractor to take a look at another matter that has just been recorded in the Maintenance Book. This is being time efficient. Time is money and maintenance costs!

If you have registered an external maintenance matter to be checked out, our maintenance coordinators do their best to work with both the resident and the contractor. When an internal maintenance matter is recorded, you will be contacted to arrange a time.

Please be respectful of each other and the Trustees contractors that come on the Trustees behalf. Good and reliable contractors are becoming scarce. We value the people we work with.

A reminder from the last Newsletter: The annual maintenance survey has been undertaken and any proposed work on a resident's property will be advised in due course.

### Gardens / Grounds

Matt continues to care for the Village grounds and is always doing various remedial work to keep the grounds in good order. Some of you will have noticed that the water feature in the lower garden, has been repaired and the paths through the woodland and rhododendron gardens are getting a refresh.

The Trustees have been asked to provide lighting on the pathway from the northern entrance of the Community Centre, past the Fish Pond and out to Elloughton Crescent. While we work on the best and cost effective lighting solution, **please use a torch** if lighting is an issue for you.

## THE AXEMAN'S CARNIVAL by Catherine Chidgey

This could have been a bleak story of a young Otago farming couple struggling to stay afloat while their relationship deteriorates beyond the point of no return, but the quirky presence of its narrator makes it a different story.

Marnie, grieving a miscarriage, rescues a baby magpie which fell out of its nest; it becomes her saviour. She mothers the chick and surrenders to its every need, prompting husband Rob's jealousy. Tama has a talent for mimicry and copies everything he hears. A tweet with a cute photo and caption leads to a growing horde of followers and suddenly Tama is famous. An agent helps the sale of merchandise to augment the family income. Meantime Rob is in training for the wood-chopping event at the annual axeman's carnival, an event he has won the previous 9 years, but his times aren't reaching his personal best. The stress, together with his hatred of Tama, lead eventually to a dramatic ending.

A good read, unless, of course, you detest magpies.

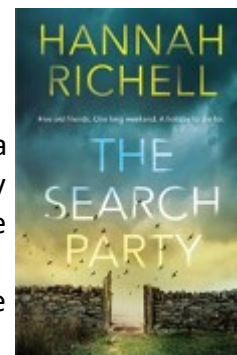


## THE SEARCH PARTY by Hannah Richell

## THE TRIAL OF NURSE KERR by Scott Bainbridge.

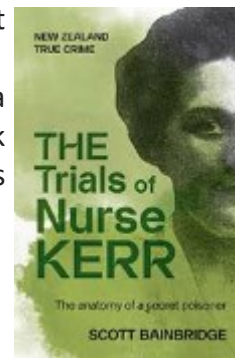
A New Zealand True Crime.

This ninth book from Scott Bainbridge tells the story of Elspeth Kerr, the owner of a nursing home in Devonport Auckland in the early 1930s. She was accused of poisoning her foster daughter. The child lived but it brought to light other suspicions. Her recently deceased husband and a lady, a patient of her hospital, who had recently died, were exhumed. So began the trial of Elspeth. It ended in a hung jury, as did the second trial. A third reached a conclusion.

The book is an insight into the era. The lack of documentation and training in the health system. The idea that it was better to let things slide (your child's death) rather than involve the "Authorities" and get yourselves talked about. Also the apparent belief if it was printed in a newspaper it must be true. Even if the paper was the salacious scandal sheet "the Truth".

Many important people in Auckland took part in the trials and they said it became a bright spot of interest in the midst of the depression. Bainbridge spent a lot of the book looking at the technicalities of the poison, but you are left not quite sure if she was guilty or not.

An interesting, quite fast read.



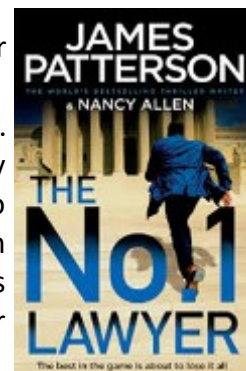
## No 1 LAWYER by James Patterson and Nancy Allen

Stafford Lee must crack the toughest case of his career. And this time, it's personal.



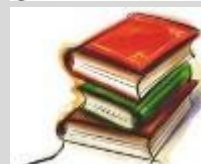
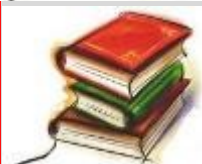

## Bloke's Morning Tea—July Report

It was nice to welcome new resident Ian Ward and Des Burtenshaw to the July meeting attended by 21 Blokes.

Everyone enjoyed the fascinating video provided by Colin about one of the significant "Tales of Survival, in Human History": the story of **Sir Ernest Shackleton** the Arctic Explorer who led three British expeditions to the Frozen Planet during the "Age of Arctic Exploration".

Following Roald Amundsen 1911 Polar conquest and Scotts failed attempt, Shackleton planed an Expedition to cross the continent of Antarctica from Sea to Sea, via the pole, a 2,900 km journey. However the expedition struck disaster when Endurance, became trapped in pack ice and sank, off McMurdo Sound, on 21 November 1915. The crew survived by abandoning ship and camping on the sea ice for 6 months then, using the salvaged lifeboats they sailed to Elephant Island then with 1 Lifeboat reached a Whaling Station, at South Georgia after enduring a violent and stormy ocean voyage of 1,330 km. That was Shackleton's most famous exploit. The men left on Elephant Is were saved on the 4<sup>th</sup> attempt by the Chilean Navy in Sept 1916. Amazingly all 28 men survived the 1 year journey living in the most hazardous and extreme conditions. Shackleton returned to the Antarctic in 1921, but died of a heart attack while his ship was moored in South Georgia.

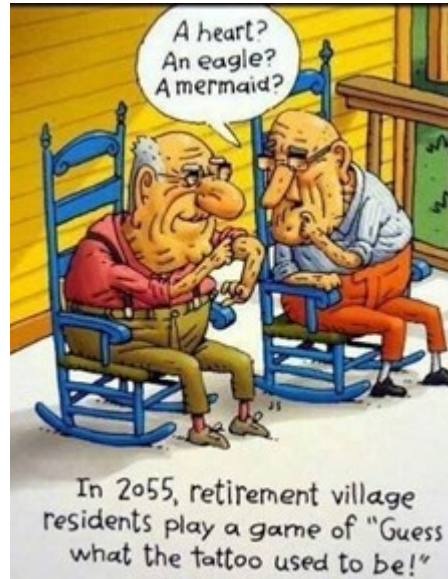
