Cards 500 Will finish 19th December followed by supper and will recommence on 16th January.


Movies will stop mid December and recommence March/April.




For me, this book started a bit slow but don't give up on it. An enjoyable easy read.




I found myself picking this book up at every opportunity. Give it a go and enjoy it like I did.
