Notes from the Trustees

The Trustees welcomed your Residents Representatives, Angela Kerr and Pamela Dunwoody, to the meeting and positive productive interactions followed that included a mutually agreed Tasks & Expectations document being adopted.

Angela and Pamela will have information in this newsletter which relates to their respective areas of responsibility and other matters pertaining to you as residents.

Caravan & Motorhome parking:

From 1st October 2024, all residents with a caravan or motorhome will be charged a \$40 monthly levy fee. This is to assist in covering costs of maintaining this parking area and is specific to those residents who use it. There are only 12 parks and are restricted for this purpose only.

Should you intend to upgrade your current motorhome or caravan in the future, the Trustees now require you to complete a form from Resident Rep. Angela Kerr for the Trustees approval. There are restrictions on size and weight that will be applied.

Renovations to Villas:

Please ensure you submit a plan and all details of the changes you are intending to make to the interior of your villa / unit. This is absolutely critical. There is a form that the admin staff will provide for you to complete. No work must be undertaken until this process has been approved by the Trustees. If in doubt, then please put your query in the Maintenance Book and Graeme Thompson will contact you to discuss your query. This also relates to any changes you would like to make to the exterior such as changing your trellis. Any maintenance matter must be recorded this way please. The paperwork MUST be done.

Another reason for this needing to be adhered to is that when your villa is put up for sale, this information needs to be available to the incoming resident.

Health and Safety

Please be considerate and **do not** feed the birds around your villa or unit. There is an increasing problem with spouting / gutters becoming blocked. It is not helpful when the Trustees are made aware of several residents regularly feeding the birds with bread/crusts and seeds!!! Only sugar water is to be used please.

The gardens at the entrance to Mountain View Village are absolutely stunning at the moment along with the Flowering Cherry trees also looking beautiful. Have you taken a walk down into the lower gardens lately? They will be looking lovely too. A sincere thank you to Matt and Chris for their ongoing care for the whole of the village gardens and grounds.

Keep writing on the sheet at the back of our books the take out date of the book. Many thanks to those that take a moment to do this. This helps us check that the book has come back into our Library.








MICKEY THE CAT WHO HELPED ME THROUGH TIMES OF CHANGE by Helen Brown




Who will win? Have a read! The cover doesn't do the book justice.

At Happy Hour & Housie Margaret enjoyed residents' company & the odd win or two - "I don't go over to win, I go over to meet the people - it's so important to, as long as I don't fall into the fish pond!" She truly appreciated the large print Housie cards & those who helped her read them. Margaret also enjoyed walking within the Village with her pusher. Catching up with family news with Raylene was important too.

"She was just a beautiful lady & it was fun to talk to her about anything at all." Kaye's comments echoes the thoughts of all who knew Margaret.




