Roading & Security

Apologies to Mahjong, who seem to have fallen off the calendar, they will continue on a Wednesday but at the slightly later time of 2pm.

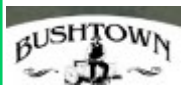


Housie will have started again by the time this is published, to the delight of many residents.

Trish and I have been renewing the labels that are sun damaged. This is ongoing work.

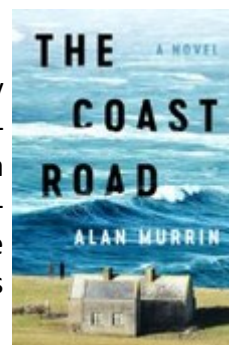

THE COAST ROAD by Alan Murrin

Set in an Irish coastal village in 1994 this novel portrays a closed community and clearly shows how the limits placed upon women cause consequences for those who rebel. Colette is a poet, a woman who forgoes family life with her husband and three sons for a relationship with a married man in Dublin. When this new relationship fails Colette returns to the village only to find her husband is denying her access to her sons. Desperate to see her sons she forms a friendship with Izzy, a mother of two and a housewife. This friendship comes at a cost for both women.

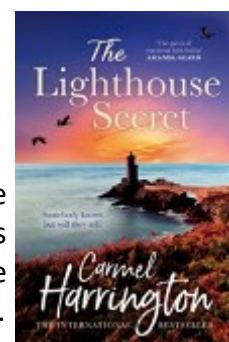


Alan Murrin's characters are portrayed with tenderness, passion and complexity. The story alternates between anger and hope, and details how prejudice can cause tragedy for those who move against the tide.

THE LIGHTHOUSE SECRET by Carmel Harrington

In Ireland, in 1951, four lighthouse keeper's wives make a pact never to tell anyone the secret that they share. A secret that will remain hidden until 2023 when one woman's granddaughter, Mollie, receives a note saying, " Family secrets never stay buried." Mollie travels to Hook lighthouse on the windswept Cork coast of Ireland searching for answers.



This is a warm-hearted story of a family drama which plays out over three generations. It contains well researched facts of lighthouse keepers' lives, and the demands made upon their wives and families. It switches effortlessly between the past and present. Carmel Harrington provides moments of sorrow (when a keeper dies), moments of helplessness (where will the keeper's family live now), moments of warmth (as the keepers' wives support each other), and moments of sisterhood (when the four wives join forces to create a solution).

What is the secret they hold? Will it be revealed? A very enjoyable read.

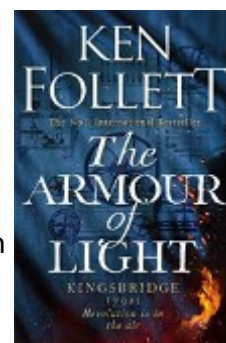


THE ARMOUR OF LIGHT by Ken Follett Kingsbridge 1792 – 1815

An enjoyable light read but I feel it should come with an excessive sex warning.

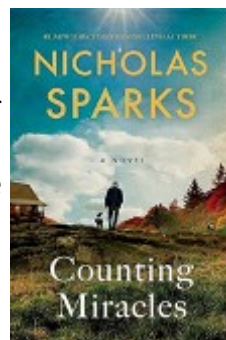


COUNTING MIRACLES by Nicholas Sparks

Tanner has spent his whole life moving from place to place, belonging nowhere. Now, in middle age, he decides to search for his unknown father. Kaitlyn is a divorced doctor with 2 children, one of them a difficult teenager. She knows exactly where she belongs. Jasper will never belong again – after losing his wife and all 4 children in a house fire decades before.

This is a love story (with a happy ending). All rather predictable, but a light, easy read.



THIS MUCH IS TRUE by Miriam Margolyes

This memoir by a well-known British actress has received many glowing reviews. However, I found it to be a lot of grandiosing, with unnecessary waffle about the many people she has met along the way during her 80year life, and therefore much of it rather boring.

She talks openly about her lesbianism, her fatness and her shortness; and I found the exploration of her Jewish roots and her views on politics, the Palestinian situation, and getting older, were interesting.

I suspect many people would not enjoy reading all the “dirty talk” (her words, not mine!)

Please make sure you and your visitors travel at 15kms or below in the village.

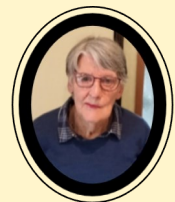

Carrot Apple Zucchini Bread

1 cup flour	2 large eggs	½ cup grated Zucchini
½ tsp baking powder	½ cup vege oil	½ cup grated apple
½ tsp baking soda	½ cup brown sugar	½ cup chopped walnuts (opt)
½ tsp cinnamon	1 tsp vanilla	¼ cup raisins (or cranberries)(opt)
¼ tsp nutmeg	1 cup grated carrot	
¼ tsp salt	½ cup sugar	

Oven 350F 175C.

Grease loaf tin. Line with baking paper.

Mix dry ingredients.

Mix wet ingredients until well combined. Stir in carrot, Zucchini and apple.

Gradually add dry ingredients. Don't over mix.

Pour batter into loaf tin and bake 60-70mins or until cooked.

Cool in pan 10mins before putting on wire rack.

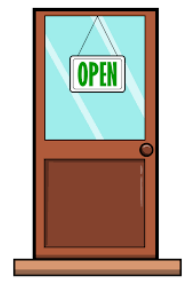

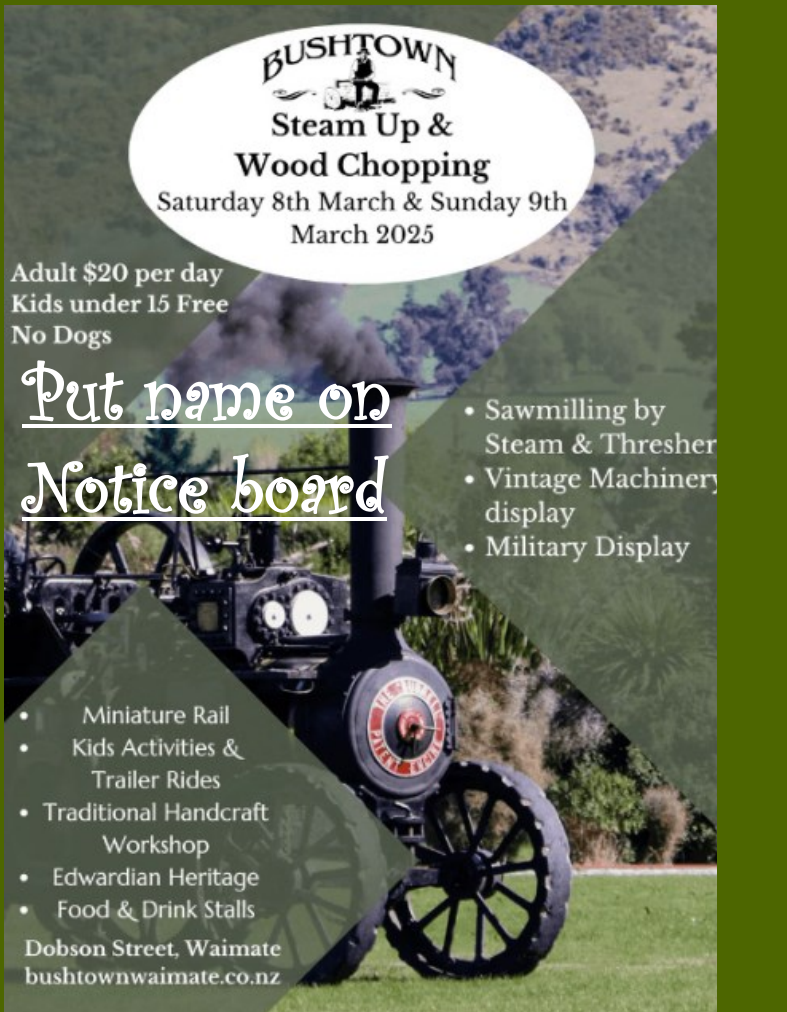
