THE EXAMINER by Janice Hallett

Six students, one murder, your time starts now. The mature students of Royal Hastings University's Art Course

have been trouble from day one and some do not seem to know much about art or technology.

This book is written mostly as social media messages, tutor reports, essays and examiner reports.

An unusual way of writing took a chapter or two but I did enjoy this book, kept you guessing till the end.

DEATH IN THE ARCTIC by Tom Hindle

The Osprey is a luxury helium airship on its maiden voyage over the Arctic. On board are 8 passengers, all personally invited by one of the owners, and 8 crew. When one of the passengers is found dead in his room, faulty equipment is blamed. But some of those on board the craft begin to wonder if it really was an accident. Could they be trapped on the airship with a killer?

The story is filled with twists and turns, the writing is light, and the plot bounces along at a good pace. It's a murder mystery with a very different setting. Agatha Christie lovers will enjoy this book.

BILLY STEAD'S RUGBY WORLD by Lynn Mcconell






THE SEVENTH FLOOR by David McCloskey





ANZAC DAY SERVICE 2025

It was pleasing to have a large attendance of residents, their families and friends attend the Village Service. After Barry Yates dropped the National flag to half mast; the service began by honouring all who have lost their lives in battle and remembering with sympathy those New Zealanders, who have suffered as prisoners of war, and those who, because of war, have had their lives shortened or handicapped.

Trish O'Brien read the biblical reading John 15:9-12 and a prayer. The ANZAC Hymn: Honour the Dead, written by New Zealander, Shirley Murray was sung.

Kay Beange, read Flanders Fields to which everyone replied.

Brenda Lyon and Clare Bishop dressed up suitably as a school girl, and a Land Girl to read the poem, "Cool Grandma." The visual image left a lasting impression about the role of the Land girls, during WW2.

I spoke about the tremendous work the Land Girls undertook to keep New Zealand farms operating during the war years, when the majority of our young men were overseas in the armed forces, on land, sea and in the air. No National recognition, was given to these hardworking girls, but 'our' Lady Fi undertook to have the only NZ memorial, built at Maungati. Also a seat and plaque were provided there by two ex land girls.

Brenda read another poem, titled "Land Girls."

Robin Harrison, our Village Trust Member laid the Village wreath and 'our piper' Maggie, thanks to technology, played the Lament, Flowers of the Forrest as poppies were laid.

The traditional ANZAC service continued, concluding with morning tea and Anzac Biscuits.

Interest was shown in the displayed photographs and information sheets of residents' family members who served overseas during the Boer War and WW1&2 and in the interesting, printed stories about the Land Girls' stories.

My sincere thanks to those who helped set up the hall and tided up. To Mark Wellford, for operating the TV for us to hear and see our Maggie playing the lament on her bagpipes, to my George for providing the music for the Hymn, National anthems Last Post and Rouse. Thank you to Jenny Crawford's family who kindly, rearranged the seating, for Happy Hour later in the day. A delightful surprise was the two lovely drawings by young Lexi who placed them with all the poppies. Thank you, Fi for sharing all the interesting information, about the Land Girls.

A red folder in the Library has the full service story and printed stories about the Land Girls.

Mine is the wind, and mine the sun The rain, the clouds, and every one of those pale stars at dawn.


Theirs is the house, and theirs the land, These hills are theirs on which I stand, And their's my bed and board.

Thanks to 'our' Lady Fi and two ex land girls, Sadie Leitze and Daphne Attfield, a beautiful, bronze sculpture commemorating the work of the New Zealand Land Girls, plus a seat and plague were placed at the Peace Walk, at Maungati in 2020. This is the only monument in New Zealand acknowledging the recognition the work the Land Girls undertook which the war commission,

politicians, RSA members and others never did. These women were never allowed to march in homecoming parades; they were told to return to womanly roles, when the men returned home.



The film follows Roz (Nyong'o), a service robot shipwrecked on an uninhabited island who must adapt to its surroundings, build relationships with the local wildlife, and become the adoptive mother of an orphaned goose, Brightbill (Connor). Can a robot survive in the wilderness? When robot Roz opens her eyes for the first time, she dis-

covers that she is alone on a remote, wild island. She has no idea how she got there or what her purpose is--but she knows she needs to survive. After battling a fierce storm and escaping a vicious bear attack, she realizes that her only hope for survival is to adapt to her surroundings and learn from the island's unwelcoming animal inhabitants. As Roz slowly befriends the animals, the island starts to feel like home until, one day, the robot's mysterious past comes back to haunt her. Nominated for 3 Oscars

Watching Nonnas felt like stepping into a beautifully warm family kitchen the kind where generations have stirred the same sauces, shared laughter over fresh pasta, and healed wounds with stories and song. This film is more than a movie; it's a soul nourishing experience, a feast for the senses, and one of the most emotionally raw

and real pieces of storytelling I've ever encountered. At its heart, Nonnas is about the blending of cultures, generations, and hearts. It's a celebration of heritage an artful layering of flavors and memories that reminded me just how powerful the human connection can be. Food becomes a metaphor for love and legacy in this story. Every scene is like a dish passed down through time, filled with care and flavor, simple yet sacred.
