#### **MVV On-Licence Process**

The Trustees are pleased to advise that the Resource Consent process to have an On-Licence for the Community Centre has been approved. The next stage is to have the Application for an On-Licence (to serve) to be approved. This is underway and we are hoping for a speedy result.

As has been previously advised, Val Fahey and Tony Kerr have completed the process to get their Manager's Licence and are now proceeding to apply for the Managers Certificate.

#### **Residents Representatives**

It is that time of the year when the Mountain View Village residents are invited to nominate two residents to be elected on your behalf to report on the various activities to the MVV Trust monthly meeting and to be the link between residents and the Trustees. It is an important role that requires both positive and respectful communications.

#### **Villa Alterations**

As has been communicated previously, **it is a requirement** that if you are planning to do an alteration or upgrade paint and paper to the interior of your villa, change an electrical appliance and/or any other changes **you must seek approval** from the Trustees before you start any work. All work must be done by a qualified trades person. All work is then recorded on your property file for future reference. If in doubt, please check with the Maintenance Co-ordinators.

#### Maintenance

Have you got a trellis near or attached to your Villa? We are aware that there are some trellises that have mould growing over them. This is not a good look for the image of the Village. Please speak to the Maintenance co-ordinators Graeme Thompson or Lester Frame for advice.

#### Mountain View Village Vehicle Policy - August 2025

#### **Mission Statement**

To ensure safety for all residents, staff and visitors within Mountain View Village.

#### Aim of this policy

To ensure all pedestrians including People with disabilities, residents and visitors are safe and not at risk from vehicles moving within the village.

As there are no footpaths, vehicle speed needs to be strongly maintained at 15km/hr, to ensure pedestrian and vehicle safety.

#### Action

- 1. Maximum speed is 15kms/hr within Mountain View Village (MVV).
- 2. All drivers and visitors are to be made aware that the roads are shared with pedestrians.
- 3. No vehicle is to park, blocking access to the specific house main entrance to allow for Emergency Services access to the front door at all times.
- 4. Drivers to abide all signs and road rules.
- 5. Parked vehicles on the road are to leave 1 meter space from driveways.
- 6. All vehicles parked within MVV must have a current WOF or COF (Cars, Utes, Motorhomes or Caravans).
- 7. Pedestrians should walk on the side of road, facing oncoming traffic and move close to the edge of road for oncoming vehicles.
- 8. Unless you park your vehicles in your Garage and/or on the driveway, (without obstructing any other vehicles in a shared drive); there will be a charge for parking a second vehicle and we recommend it is parked near the MVV residents' workshop or in Motorhome/Caravan park if space is available. The Charge applying for parking your second or other vehicle off your driveway or in garage, is set by the MVV Trust.
- 9. A month's notice is to be given by the Resident to the MVV Trust, if their second or other vehicle is leaving MVV permanently and charges are to stop.
- MVV Trust will give Vehicle owners 1 month notice if their vehicle needs to be removed from the Motorhome/ Caravan Park.
- 11. Visiting Motorhomes are permitted to be parked within Mountain View Village for 1-2 nights only, with application to and consent of the MVV Trust.
- 12. Those charging EV vehicles, bikes and scooter are expected to use the recommended charging devises as provided by the manufacturer and to plug into appropriate and recommended power source.

#### The following relates to Owners of Motorhomes or Caravans

- 1. Resident's Motorhomes or Caravans can park on their driveway, for a maximum of 48 hours, or park outside the owner's home on street for a maximum of 48 hours, prior to departure and on return from a trip, for convenience of loading and unloading.
- 2. MVV Trust may issue written permission in certain circumstances for Motorhomes or Caravans to be parked in driveways for longer than 48 hours, upon receipt of a letter from the resident requesting this permission and advising the circumstances.
- 3. Motorhomes and Caravans owned by MVV residents are to be parked in the designated parking area and the owner is to pay the monthly charge from 1 April 2025, as set by the MVV Trust.
- 4. Consent for parking in the designated Motorhome / Caravan area, is at the discretion of the MVV Trust. Size and weight of vehicle will be considered before permission is given. This permission must be re-obtained for any subsequent Recreational vehicles (RV) before they are brought on site.
- 5. Motorhome / Caravan parking Consent Form with Terms & Conditions is to be signed by the Resident(s) owning a Motorhome / Caravan which they wish to park in the designated parking area.
- 6. Motorhome / Caravan parking Consent Form is an appendix to this Policy.

Policy review - This policy will be reviewed after its first year and two yearly thereafter. Mountain View Village Trust

#### THREE WEE BOOKSHOPS AT THE END OF THE WORLD by Ruth Shaw

Ruth started writing children's stories at age 20 for a New Guinea newspaper going onto win a writing competition in NSW. Her Three Wee Bookshops is a Love, Laugh and Sometimes tears. The shops are in Ruth's and Husbands (the love of her life) Lance's garden at Manapouri, after selling their business of Fiordland Ecology Holidays. Both avid sailors and divers, being Greenies and set to protect the NZ wildlife. Ruth has many stories of nurturing and saving all types of animals. One that stands out for me is lining her bath with plastic and filling it with 7mm of ground, leaves and sticks for a family of sparrows, also saving a Bumble Bee which she carried around in a box. There are also sad times of losing animals.

#### Village Church Service—July Report

- ♦2025 July church service was taken by Rev Sue Dickson from St Mary's Anglican Church. Faith from the Salvation Army Church cheerfully returned again to play the piano. The service began, with everyone who braved the very cold day, to attend, singing the hymn, Be Thou My Vision. The following hymns were also sung, Praise, my Soul, the King of Heaven and Just a Closer Walk with Thee.
- Numbers, the theme for Sue's message, go back to before the birth of Christ; they have been used in business, in math's, in early science, people then, were fascinated by numbers. The book of Numbers in the bible name came from Census taking. It contains some of the very first censuses to happen; it was the years between the Jews escaping from captivity in Egypt to their settling in Canaan. A period of fifteen thousand years, starting about three thousand BC when the Jews began with a caravan of people, escaped slaves. Then the families merged into groups, these became extended families and grew and grew. Census would be taken at each stage. Eventually they became separate tribes, when they had been one once, each with their own divisions. They became known as the twelve tribes of Israel. There was a big religious side to it as well in the use of numbers; it required a certain mystic. In the New Testament there are what is called Mystical numbers. The number of people fed by a certain number of loaves and fishes, number of sections in the Lord's prayer, number of deadly sins etc. Mystical, meaning not to be taken literally. Jesus often asked how many times we should forgive others, not 7 but 70 times 7. That was a mystical way that next time you hear that reading, it means always. It reminds us to praise God as often as we can. Amen.
- ◆ Prayer-O Lord Jesus you are a loving and caring Father to us all. Dear Father, I pray for the people who are here and those who are not this morning. Lord this world is a crazy, crazy place but to come here and feel the beauty of faith and feel its presence here is such a joy. I pray for each person here, that they will be filled with your spirit. Lord it's a pretty gray day out there but the smiles on the faces of the people here have made my heart happy. And Lord, remind us, you never leave us, in our grief you are there beside us, in our happiness you are there beside us. We pray for those who work in this place, make it safe. Amen


