



A good read.




BOLEYN TRAITOR by Philippa Gregory (Reviewed by Kay Beange)

A new Philippa Gregory historic novel written in her usual informative way, interlaced with fact and fiction, spying and conspiracy of King Henry VIII's court.

The story of Jane Boleyn head lady in waiting to Queen Anne, it covers the downfall of Queen Anne and of her beheading and the new Queen Jane Seymour, who Jane B also served. It covers Jane spying for Thomas Cromwell (I had to reread parts as there are several Jane's, Ann's and Mary's, to work out which one it was). Jane Boleyn is married to George Boleyn the brother of Queen Anne. Jane Boleyn ends up being Lady in Waiting to five of Henry VIII's wives.

A good read.




WILD DARK SHORE by Charlotte McConaghy (Reviewed by Lynne Kroening)

On Shearwater, a tiny island between Australia and Antarctica, Dominic Salt and his three children are caretakers of the world's largest seed bank. As the sea levels rise and begin to inundate the research station all the scientists leave, and the Salt family are the island's final inhabitants. During the most ferocious storm the family has ever seen a woman is mysteriously washed ashore. As the family nurse Rowan back to health, they begin to realise she isn't telling the whole truth about why she came to Shearwater. However, the family are also keeping their own secrets. Who sabotaged the communication centre? Who is lying in a freshly dug grave? As the storms increase in frequency and height everyone must work together to save the precious seed bank.

Charlotte McConaghy skilfully portrays an isolated environment in all its beauty, and highlights its dangers, both physical and emotional, while simultaneously twisting and turning the plot with incredible insight into human behaviour, and the lengths we may go to in an effort to keep safe those we love.

A fascinating read!



Village Church Service - March Report

Rev Dennis Veal, from St John's Anglican Church, led the service after being welcomed by Kay Beange. The service began with the Hymn; Praise my soul the King of Heaven sung by everyone. The biblical reading from the Gospel Matthew 17: 1-13, the Transfiguration, was the read by Dennis prior to his message.

"We tend to take the transfiguration for granted. But the transfiguration is a significant message from God, as it's background reveals. Yes, the Jews were expecting the Messiah but...they imagined a marshal figure who would vanquish the hated Romans and establish Gods Kingdom in their place. The idea of a Prince of Peace, a Saviour, a righteous judge, would not really have registered with them. The Scribes and the Pharisees thought they had it right; the Romas were the fly in the ointment. The Transfiguration, is to set the scene for Jesus ministry and the top three disciples were about to get the message. Every good Jew knows he was descended from Abraham. His ancestors had been bought out of slavery in Egypt where Moses has received the Law from God on Mt Sinai. So Moses and Elijah, law and prophets met with the Jews at the transfiguration. "I come to fulfill the law not abolish it." It is such a fantastic moment, the impetuous Peter want to take a selfie, so to speak. But the voice of God as at Jesus baptism, said, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased. Listen to Him." As Disciples of Christ we serve others. What a difference it will make to our sad world if all served as Christ served. "This is my beloved Son. Listen to Him."



The very appropriate Hymn, Here I am Lord, was then sung.

Prayer for ourselves- "Help us Lord to have a grin upon our face, to see how much we all enjoy your world. To have a look of love, on our face so all may know that someone cares. To have a frown on our face so that all who practice injustice, be aware it has been noticed. To have a look of enthusiasm so all may enquire, what we have to smile about. Amen."

The service concluded by singing the hymn, Spirit of God unseen on the wind. Kay thanked both Dennis; and Elaine Caird our pianist, for sharing their time with us.

Helen Black was runner up in both categories at her first attempt. Well done!






